## **Pastor Cindy Buhman Reflects on Her Ministry**



When I retire June 30, 2024, I will have been in the ministry 27 years! I attended Maysville Methodist Church while growing up. It became UMC in 1968, before I started High School in 1970.

Joe and I will be married 47 years this August. Before I was in the ministry, I was a stay-at-home mom for 14 years before starting seminary. I provided child care for other children and did lots of substitute teaching. I directed a preschool before we had children and did free-lance writing for the local newspaper.

I had always been active in the Maysville church, especially in United Methodist Women, singing in the choir, helping with Sunday School and VBS, etc. In May, 1995, the District Superintendent, Glenn Wiggs, attended the Maysville church for worship. As he was retiring in June that year, I thanked him for his service. He thanked me for mine and then asked the question, "Have you ever thought about ministry?" I said, "Yes. I want to be a lay speaker someday when my boys are older. And I think I would make a dandy Conference UMW president." He said, "That's not what I'm talking about. I mean clergy." I said, "No. I could

never do that." His response was "Well... just think about it." And he proceeded to share about the gifts he saw in me. Long story short... I couldn't think about much else. A few months later, I began working with our pastor Stan Lowrey to explore the calling and options. I began seminary in the fall of 1996, taking three classes to see if I could even do it. It had been 19 years since I was in a classroom! I did pretty well. And never turned back.

Joe did not marry a pastor so it was a drastic change for us. The whole family was impacted, of course. I depended upon Joe more than ever, and my parents, too. Our sons were 14, 11, and 7 at the time. They learned how to run the dishwasher and the washer and dryer. And each one had their microwave specialty! One of the hardest things for me was not being able to attend every class party or field trip for Ethan as I had for his older brothers. My guys supported me throughout, and I think they were/are proud of me. Joe has been my greatest cheerleader! I remember Mitchell saying once, "I can't believe my mom is going back to school. And she's doing it on purpose!"

I am thankful for Saint Paul School of Theology in Kansas City because it is so close. I would not have been able to go otherwise. I graduated in 2000, was commissioned a provisional elder that year and was ordained by Bishop Ann Sherer in 2003, in the first and only class to be ordained under the Budweiser scoreboard in the Hearnes Center in Columbia!

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What an amazing week! I knew what the remodeling plan was, what the drawing looked like, but to actually see the demo work and the new space taking shape has been incredible. All I can say is WOW! The work is progressing quickly, with completion of Phase 1 expected before the end of May.

With this new open space comes much potential for kicking up our level of hospitality. Please keep your eyes and ears and hearts open for ways you can express hospitality to each other and to the guests who will come. And... you might start making a list of people you want to invite to check out our new space and to experience worship with us here at Clair UMC.

My original plan was to spend eight years in that role (the maximum allowed), which would get me to retirement age. While the work was rewarding, it was also stressful. After three years and losing some hair, I accepted that administrative work was not my strongest suit and that I would be much happier in a local congregation. I'm all about relationship so getting to know people in church ministry and being a part of their lives is what I love most. I am so honored that people allow me to enter into their lives, that they share their highest and lowest moments with me.

I treasure my time as a DS, though. I especially enjoyed meeting people across the district, supporting pastors, and helping the pastors and congregations to grow in their mission and ministry.

The best part of being a superintendent was getting to know so many pastors throughout the district – and their churches as well – helping pastors with resources to enhance their ministries and discipleship-making. Being aware of and having input into the larger picture of the Missouri Conference was also a special part of serving on the Cabinet.

I have mentioned before that one of my strengths is being a cheerleader. That involves keeping a group motivated, energized, excited, involved, encouraged to keep on. Positivity is my number one strength, so it is natural for me to see the best and the positive in any situation. It is especially important to celebrate victories with the folks we lead, to help them feel good about what they have accomplished and to see God at work. It's fun to celebrate even the smallest victories. Jesus loved to party! And so do I!

COVID was a hard time for all churches. We were forced to do some things differently in order to survive. Both Clair and Ebenezer embraced the technology to be able to worship online, to survive the pandemic, and to emerge even stronger than before. I am so thankful for Jen and Josh at Ebenezer who led the way technologically and helped me to adjust to this new way of doing church.

I believe important attributes for an effective pastor include: Focus on relationships – it is so important to get to know people and to let them know that I really care about them. A sense of humor is important, too!

Willingness to try new things – a philosophy I developed years ago has served me well: "A thing not tried can't work."

Ministry has been full of joy-filled moments: baptisms, confirmations, serving Holy Communion, Christmas Eve services, Easter sunrise, Holy Humor Sundays, whenever and wherever we are the church together. I feel especially close to God when experiencing the beauty of nature – the ocean, the mountains, sunsets, fragrant flowers, bodies of water, etc. And... I feel close to God while in corporate worship, singing, praying, sharing in Holy Communion, being the church together. I have been touched recently by *The Chosen* class on Wednesday evenings – watching the video, tying the theme to scripture, having conversation. It's all very special!



Open Door Food Kitchen comes to mind first as an important mission at Clair. Our service there means so much to those who come for a meal. And the service means so much to the team who serves. Our work with Sisters of Solace was also special to me. What a great program with the opportunity to really be involved in the transformation of lives.

In reviewing accomplishments, an accomplishment that has to top the list is the capital improvements project at Clair. It is something this congregation has talked about for years and years. To be at a spot where we felt financially able to enter into a campaign was huge. Then, the response to the campaign was terrific. And now that the work has begun, it is so amazing to think about all the possibilities for the future. I am very proud of us!

I have said several times that I will especially miss the children, because I know many of them won't remember me. We have had lots of fun together. What a joy it has been to watch them grow and to help them to learn more about God! I am so honored to have had a part in their lives. And, it will be hard to leave behind the relationships we all have formed during these six years.

The thing I do for fun right now is to read mystery novels. And, I love watching sports, from our grandsons' ball games to the Chiefs and the Royals.
